There has indeed been much "life" happening at the Guild. After nearly eight years at the helm of the SWG, Judith Silverthorne retired, paving the way for a new Executive Director. As outlined in our policies, a clear succession plan had been developed resulting in long-time Program Manager Tracy Hamon assuming the role of Interim Executive Director. A selection process was undertaken by an arms-length committee resulting in Tracy being selected as the full-time Executive Director of the Guild. Congratulations, Tracy, and thank you, Judith, for your dedication and commitment to the Guild. It has been a pleasure to work with both of you.

Change also came last year in the form of union certification of the non-management staff. This relationship continues to emerge. The Board supports the employees in our new unionized environment and remains committed to bargaining in good faith towards a healthy and supportive workplace for all. Negotiating a collective agreement is the next step and the Board awaits an initial proposal from the unionized staff.

In attempting to build a better understanding of the organizational elements of the Guild, we have partnered with SaskCulture in LifeCycles, a pilot project designed to evaluate key organizational elements. The Guild was selected along with three other provincial organizations to engage in the process. In this phase, there will be a review of our

governance policies as well as the development of a new strategic plan. The Guild will work with targeted consultants towards those ends and we're thankful for the opportunity and support provided by SaskCulture.

As for plans, 2019 will mark the 50th Anniversary of the formation of the Saskatchewan Writers' Guild. There will be celebrations, tributes, and legacy initiatives and I welcome you, the membership, to share your ideas and give of your time to make it a year to remember. Watch for announcements!

Next year will also mark the 10th anniversary of the Cheryl and Henry Kloppenburg Award for Literary Excellence, a prestigious recognition of a Saskatchewan writer that is receiving much deserved national attention.

Diverse, accessible, and exemplary programming continues to be at the heart and soul of the SWG. Throughout all the changes, this core has remained solid, with membership participation driving the Guild's programs. Honest and constructive feedback are key to ongoing success and to the development of new programming for an ever evolving membership.

Finally, I want to take this opportunity to thank the membership of the Saskatchewan Writers' Guild for allowing me to serve as your President for the past three years. While it has been filled with many challenges, it has been an honour to work with such a diverse group of individuals who care for the well being of the Guild and the health of our writing community. Your understanding of and support for the Guild has made the task much easier. Thank you to the volunteer directors of the Board, senior staff, and the many members who have taken the time to both bend my ear and listened to my rants about process.

You have made me feel welcomed and I thank you.

Jack Walton President The SWG's 49th year slid by financially on vacancy management's skates. This means that with a decreased staff, the Guild was able to keep finances on track without any program repercussions. With the retirement of long-time Executive Director Judith Silverthorne and the search for the new Executive Director of the SWG, operational management and staffing stayed a steady course with reduced numbers. In May, a new ED (that's me!) was hired and I official began as the permanent ED on June 1

Although we were in the last year of our Annual Global Funding, we were provided with funding for the 2018-19 fiscal year while SaskCulture negotiates a new contract with Saskatchewan Lotteries. Our Canada Council operating grants for *Grain* and programs are now combined into one grant application and we were able to increase the amount to about \$55,000 from \$53,000. Our City of Regina funding also remains stable at \$24,000 and we have two more years of funding in our operating grant.

In memberships, the SWG welcomed a bevy of new writers, bringing our membership back up to over 550. Our increase may be attributed to the new policies surrounding Associate Membership

just due to the quality of programming and services, and the great outreach by our SWG Board of Directors and staff. I prefer to think the latter!

As for programming, we kept what works, focusing on our summer reading series, mentorships, retreats, manuscript evaluations, and workshops to name a few. In publications, we revamped *Freelance* and *Ebriefs*. We saw every program as an opportunity to increase our diversity and to be inclusive.

We wished Oin Nicholson well in new ventures across the country and we welcomed a new baby, Freya, for Administrative Assistant Andrea MacLeod. We welcomed temporary Administrative Assistant, Saba Dar, who joined us as an intern and stayed. I'm happy to welcome Program Manager Yolanda Hansen and Program Coordinator Cat Abenstein to the SWG programming team—please introduce yourself to them when you meet them. Also, huge thank yous to every volunteer and committee member—your dedication to the Guild helps to keep us pulsing in the community

Although Albert Einstein maintains that "time is an illusion," the SWG continues to walk one foot at a time forward to a half a century. It's my anticipation that we'll continue to embrace our diverse cultural milieu, continue expanding our membership's horizons with our programming and services and that all of us can continue to read, write and converse about writing.

# ARTS ORGANIZATIONS PANEL DISCUSSIONS

With help from the Saskatchewan Film Pool and IndigenX Media, the conversation was professionally recorded and is available to all the organizations' membership as a resource.

# NATIONAL INDIGENOUS PEOPLES' DAY

Saskatchewan Writers' Guild was pleased to partner, once again, with the Circle Project's day-long celebration of National Indigenous Peoples' Day in inner-city Regina. The event hosted musical acts, crafting, a free BBQ, and a storytellers' tipi sponsored by SWG. Elder Hazel Dixon and Rhonda Donais participated in the storytellers' tipi, engaging in hands-on activities, history lessons, and oral story traditions throughout the afternoon.

The SWG also partnered with the Indigenous Poets' Society to host a spoken word event in downtown Saskatoon. Spoken word poets Kevin Wesaquate, Janelle Pewapsconias, and Shawn Joseph shared their work covering themes such as decolonization, cultural appropriation, revitalization, and reclamation of Indigenous languages to a smaller, more intimate dinner crowd.

# FIRST NATIONS READING SERIES

The First Nations University and the Office of Indigenization through the University of Regina partnered with the SWG once again this year. For our fall semester reading, we hosted Louise Bernice Halfe and Tenille Campbell. The talk focused on Indigenous female sexuality in writing, as well as ties to the land, language, and tradition. Held at the First Nations University, the event was well-attended and engaging.

For the winter semester reading, we hosted poets Billy Ray Belcourt and Gwen Benaway. The authors explored how writing from a queer and trans perspective informed their writing, covering topics of online relationships, popular culture, #CanLit and more. This event was also partnered with the Heritage Community Association and UR Pride, and was followed by a writing workshop that gave preference to young, Indigenous, LGBTQ2S+ writers. The poets engaged and interacted in handson writing activities for 15 participants.

# STORYTELLING EVENTS

With generous funding from Library Services for Saskatchewan Aboriginal Peoples once again, Aboriginal Storytellers' month hosted various events in Regina, Saskatoon, and Prince Albert. For the first time ever, SWG paired with the Grandmothers at the University of Regina. Grandmothers Lillian Piapot and Margaret Masney engaged in a come-and-go storytelling session with Indigenous and non-Indigenous students at the Aboriginal Student Centre on campus. The gathering proved to be a much needed and appreciated break from studying.

In Saskatoon, Tenille Campbell engaged with Indigenous students at the Gordon Oakes Aboriginal Student Centre at the University of Saskatoon. Her engagement included elements of humour and intimacy and how they inform our way of storytelling.

The Mann Art Gallery in Prince Albert hosted author and artist Leah Dorion. Although the weather was a challenge, the SWG had full registration for her afternoon workshop. Dorion engaged the techniques of storytelling with her audience in ways that included age-friendly material, art, and props.

# **AUTHOR READINGS PROGRAM**

The SWG was pleased to subsidize 54 authors through the Author Readings Program. For this fiscal year, there have been 143 readings with more than 8300 attendees. This well-established SWG program saw 109 schools, libraries, and community groups host the readings. While the host pays a minimal registration fee to the SWG for the author to do their reading, the Guild pays the author a more significant reading fee plus mileage to and from the venues. Host organizations have been encouraged to better report their attendees at events and this improved self-reporting has allowed us to create a clearer snapshot of the program reach. Some events had over 500 people experiencing the talent of Saskatchewan authors at one time. Towards the end of the fiscal year, we even had to turn down some applicants. The program used the entirety of the allocated budget for 2017-2018.

# **RURAL WORKSHOPS**

The SWG was able to offer rural communities professional development opportunities to hone their writing skills. This fiscal year, the timing and structure of the readings/ workshops remained flexible for hosts and authors as the community and the invited authors often provided both the workshop and reading in one day. Funding for this program is from the Canada Council and two community workshops were held this fiscal year.

# GRAIN REPORT

Grain, the journal of eclectic writing, is a literary quarterly in print, thanks to funding from the Canada Council for the Arts and the continued support of operational funding from Saskatchewan Lotteries through SaskCulture. It has continued to publish engaging, diverse, and challenging work by writers and visual artists on a provincial, national, and international level.

Volume 45 saw 90 writers published, for a total of 125 published pieces, plus six Short Grain Contest-winning pieces. *Grain* also published four visual artists in volume 45—Kathryn Macnaughton, Rajni Perera, and Saskatchewan artists, Phomohobes and Tim Moore. Grain went into volume 45 with a new Editor, Nicole Haldoupis, and Guest Associate Editors, dee Hobsbawn-Smith for poetry, and Edward Willett for fiction. The second half of volume 45 saw a new permanent editorial team, consisting of Editor Nicole Haldoupis, Poetry Editor dee Hobsbawn-Smith, and Fiction and Nonfiction Editor Terry Jordan. University of Saskatchewan MFA in Writing students, Simon Boehm, Carolyn Gray, and Dylan Rea, volunteered as preliminary readers to help tackle the backlog of fiction submissions which accumulated as a result of staffing changes and a rise in submissions, and to help us with our goal of having shorter response times. We celebrated the new team and winter issue with a launch party at McNally Robinson,

which featured readings by Saskatchewan writers Bruce Rice, David Carpenter, dee Hobsbawn-Smith, and Terry Jordan. Stephanie Campbell, the SWG Publications Coordinator, continued as *Grain*'s Designer, and Leah MacLean-Evans as *Grain*'s Proofreader.

General submissions remained high this year at 2112 (1081 poetry, 868 fiction, and 163 literary nonfiction submissions). Although we're slightly down from last year's 2231, we're up more than 30% from two years ago. The consistent inflow of submissions is likely a result of Submittable, where writers can submit work online for free, making the submission process more accessible.

Subscriptions fell again this year, from 598 in 2015-16, to 394 in 2016-17, to 220 in 2017-18, with 90% in Canada (17% from Saskatchewan), and 10% international subscribers, from the US, Thailand, and Germany. There were also 220 individual issues sold for the year. We ran two, two-year subscription promotions this year, one as a winter holiday sale and the other this summer as a 45th anniversary sale, which helped to boost subscribers.

Submissions for our annual Short *Grain* contest went up from 117 last year to 132, with 74 fiction submissions and 58 poetry. Aside from ten US entries, one from Thailand, and one from Germany, most were Canadian.





O22 SWG Annual Report 2017/2018

he results of the annual audit were presented to the Audit Committee on September 17, 2018. MWC Chartered Accountants conducted the audit and were satisfied with the SWG accounting practices, requiring no adjusting journal entries for the past fiscal year. For those of you not familiar with audit practice this is a phenomenal feat for the SWG accountant. Congratulations, Jacquie!

The auditor notes will provide some explanation for questions that may arise from the financial statements. They are found after the Cash Flow Statement.

Some amounts that may draw your attention:

**ASSETS:** In 2017, the transfer from Cash to Short Term Investment had not yet occurred at audit time whereas it had taken place in time for the 2018 audit.

**LIABILITIES:** The bulk of the amount in Deferred revenue is the transfer of SWG funds to the SWG Foundation. These funds are earmarked for programs and events.

**REVENUES:** Beyond the usual Self-generated funds (detailed on Schedule 2) this amount contains the reimbursement of the intern's wages from the Regina Women's Immigrant Centre. The intern performed the duties of an Administrative Assistant.

Retreat revenue increased because there was no summer retreat in 2017 but it was held again in 2018. Notice the retreat expenses in the next section have increased accordingly.

**EXPENSES:** The Operational Expenses increase was due, in large part, to legal fees for labour negotiations.


Salaries and benefits are less for 2018 because some positions were not filled or only filled part-time during portions of the year.

**CHANGES IN NET ASSETS:** The net surplus for 2018 increases the SWG reserve fund by \$32,849. SaskCulture encourages non-profit organizations to build a six-month reserve of expenses.

In summary, the SWG is currently on sound footing with a reserve of \$250,346, over half-way to the recommended amount.

If you are familiar with any type of finance and are willing to serve on the Audit Committee, please contact the SWG office. A minimal commitment of one meeting per year is required, along with monitoring quarterly financial statements.













