### President's Message

In my interactions with SWG members over the past year, they have consistently expressed that we are fostering an enabling, inclusive, savvy, eclectic, and omnipresent community. This reflects positively on the health of the Guild, as we continue to operate at full capacity, providing support, enhancement, promotion, and preservation of writing resources and standards across Saskatchewan—from the boreal forest to the high prairie and the grasslands of the south.

The SWG got going with its ambitious programs and services back in 1969, dedicated to writers in our province, and has been serving writers at every stage of development for fifty-five years and counting.

The SWG is dedicated to demystifying and delivering information and tools for both established and beginner writers. We consistently advocate for writers and offer workshops and programs throughout the year. Additionally, the Guild provides guided and unguided retreats, publishes the literary journal *Grain*, and other helpful publications like *Ebriefs* and *Freelance*. We also publish *Windscript* as a writing catalyst for secondary school age writers, and *spring*, which gives a leg up to new writers every other year.

In 2023/24, participants took part in many Guild offerings, including: Writing North, Talking Fresh, Tân'si Talks, Penned Up, Indigenous Storytelling Month, and our Annual Conference with its lineup of rock star writers from Saskatchewan. Our manuscript evaluation service, mentorship programs, the Poet Laureate program, Writers Group grants, and Writer-in-Residence programs provided a wealth of support and inspiration. And, the Kloppenburg Literary Excellence Award, the City of Regina Writing Award, the John V. Hicks Long Manuscript Award, the Hyland Volunteer Award, and the Guild Prize honour the best.

There are close to 650 members who benefit from a stable seven figure budget, the sources of which funds include Sask Lotteries, the Canada Council for the Arts, the City of Regina and many individual donors.

This past year your Board completed and put into motion our new Strategic Plan. Especially industrious has been Ashley Martin, our Past President, who stick-handled the business of relentlessly tidying up our governance practices, resulting in new language, clarity and access. Monica Johnson is one of those wizards of finance who notices every detail. The insights, commitment and hard work on our



various committees of Helen Chang, Daryl Sexsmith, Margot Johnson, Victoria Johnson, Tim Blackett, and Miguel French is very much appreciated. Blessings all for everything you did this past year to make the Guild a success.

Going forward we are ramping up our SWG Foundation, on the lookout for more money, more friends and expanded relationships. We are stoked to strengthen and expand the mandate and operations of the Guild for the benefit of our members as we go about enhancing the writing arts.

My term as President concludes this year. I will now focus on steering our Foundation and being the Guild's past president, succeeding Ashley Martin who is retiring from the board to begin the adventure and challenge of parenthood. The SWG team and members have taught me a lot, for which I am very grateful. There was much I had to learn about the writing universe in Saskatchewan and about how our metamorphosing culture affects the writing community we serve.

The Guild is a very special organization, unique in Canada. Not early old age yet, but a vital middle-age outfit with people who believe deeply in its mission and values and are busy making things happen every day.

The SWG remains under the attentive guard of our Board of Directors. This past year they volunteered their time to help create and disseminate a survey to our community. The survey was part of a capacity building project provided by the Lifecycles program and was made possible by the support of SaskCulture. We're grateful to SaskCulture for the opportunity to learn more about our members and what they want from the SWG. Our board takes a keen interest in building our SWG foundations (including the SWG

Foundation and scholarships) for our members, our community, and our community beyond; we appreciate that they help to inform the SWG in all that we do.

Thank you once again to our funders for all they provide to the SWG:
SaskLotteries (in partnership with SaskCulture) for our Annual Global Funding, City of Regina, Canada Council, SK Lotteries Community Grant through the City of Saskatoon, and Heritage Canada, for Grain's 50th anniversary funding. We're thankful for their support as it helps us deliver our programs and services.

The clues to the right foundation are on the labels: great staff are listed as the key ingredients. In fact, our programming team is so dexterous and extraordinary that we gave them bigger roles: Yolanda Hansen became the Program Director, Cat Abenstein the Program Manager, and Tea Gerbeza the Program Coordinator. Debbie Sunchild-Petersen remains the Indigenous Coordinator, but she's taken on some extra Saskatoon programming administration in the

past few months. We're thankful that this dynamic team provides not only a full eight hours of coverage, but an incredible year's worth of astonishing programming.

Over at *Grain*, we said goodbye to Editor Mari-Lou Rowley, along with Associate Poetry Editor Brenda Schmidt. Their keen eyes helped produce some astonishing issues and we were grateful for their skills. Our 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary issue and launches were a highlight of fall 2023! In early 2024, we welcomed Elena Bentley as the new Editor, Taidgh Lynch as the new poetry editor—they joined fantastic fiction editor Kate O'Gorman; we thank them for their work in producing some exciting issues.

In other publication news, we continued to explore writing, writers, and the craft of writing in *Freelance*, we produced the special bi-annual *spring* magazine, featuring emerging Saskatchewan writers, and we published *Windscript*, our high school writing showcase. Our gratitude again goes to Shirley Fehr for designing,

managing, and overseeing the production of all our publications.

In SWG finances, Ashwina Parmar left us and gave birth to baby girl in the fall of 2023. Congratulations to her and her family. Since Ashwina's departure, our thanks goes to temporary bookkeepers Jennifer Kehler, Manvi Khare, and Sharon Johnson. They helped to keep the SWG financial lines furrow-free.

Andrea MacLeod provided the best overall coverage in her role as our Executive Assistant. From tackling questions on the phone, arranging board meetings, overseeing all things office related, her expertise is truly appreciated by all.

During our productive and substantial year, we enjoyed meeting and learning with and about you, our many members. Thank you for being a part of the SWG and most importantly, continuing to be the top ingredient in our foundation. Our goal is to continue to build our foundations in the SWG and the SWG Foundation; you make us look good (blush)!

### **Author Readings Program**



### Regina Open Door Society - Opening Doors Through Stories

A group of newcomers to Canada met in-person in Regina over four Saturdays in October and November through the Regina Open Door Society (RODS) to work with author Marie Powell to develop creative writing and expand their English literacy skills.

Opening Doors Through Stories: Home, the sixth chapbook in the Opening Doors Through Stories series, is a collection of stories and poems reflective of participants' personal experiences and perspectives and is a testament to the resiliency of the human spirit.

In May, the *Opening Doors Through* Stories: Home launch was held in-person with our facility partners, the Regina Public Library, and was also livestreamed to a public audience, with a recording made available on the SWG's YouTube for 30 days following the event. The event was hosted by facilitator and editor Marie Powell.

Between in-person attendees, live online attendees, and video views, the Chapbook Launch was viewed by over 200 people.

### Global Gathering Place – Weaving Words

In partnership with The Global Gathering Place (GGP), the SWG offered newcomers to Canada in Saskatoon two creative writing opportunities to develop their storytelling and writing skills.

Danica Lorer facilitated two 10-hour workshop series in August and March with 28 participants. Both workshop groups explored memory and imagination through creative writing and shared their writing in a celebratory environment. These sessions are supported by the City of Saskatoon's SK Lotteries Community Grant.

### SaskBooks Publishing Symposium

The SWG, SaskBooks, Regina Public Library, and the Saskatoon Public Library offered writers and publishers a chance to learn more about things that affect publishing at our two-part online Publishing Symposium in April.

### Write Out Loud Poetry -SKribe Youth Poetry Festival

In July, in partnership with Write Out Loud Poetry, a youth spoken word community in Saskatoon, we partnered to present a professional development session for youth interested in writing two-person collaborative poetry, or affectionately called "team pieces" by spoken word artists. The session was facilitated by Caraganna Ennis and Dash Reimer at the Remai Modern with 12 participants from across Saskatchewan. ### **Poets Laureate**

Poet Laureate dee Hobsbawn-Smith and Youth Poet Laureate Lauren Klassen represented the Saskatchewan literary community in a variety of virtual and in-person events and initiatives in 2023-24.

### Youth Poet Laureate

Lauren Klassen had a busy year for her second Youth Poet Laureate term. She led writing workshops at six different schools across Saskatchewan and worked in 23 different classes from grades 5 to 12, reaching an audience of 659 students. She also led a Regina Open Door Society youth workshop, reaching 20 newcomers to Canada. She was involved in a national Zoom meet up of other Youth Poet Laureates in Canada, was featured in a Star Phoenix Bridges profile, a special CBC Blue Sky Poetry Month episode with the Poet Laureate and will be featured in a student documentary on CBC.

The Youth Poet Laureate program is proudly sponsored by the RBC Emerging Artists program.

### Poet Laureate

As Poet Laureate, dee Hobsbawn-Smith spoke to poetry loving audiences all over the province; from Assiniboia and Moose Jaw in southern SK to Rosthern and Saskatoon in central SK and other points between. dee's readings took place at festivals, art galleries, meetings with university faculty, MFA students and cultural and artistic workers, public workshops at libraries and readings at both Regina and Saskatoon City Council. She was introduced in the Saskatchewan Legislative Assembly and read at the Legislative Library. Her readings and poet's rambles engaged almost 700 people during her term.

Both Poets were involved in the 2024 Poetry Soiree and the Youth Poet Laureate Showcase at the 2023 Conference. Two Poetry & A Pint reading events were hosted: Poetry & A Pint Saskatoon Nov 2 with dee Hobsbawn-Smith, Lauren Klassen and three local poets Erica Violet Lee, Francine Merasty and Katherine Lawrence. May 11th's event at Bushwakker's Brew Pub featured readings by dee Hobsbawn-Smith, Tara Dawn Solheim, Michael Trussler and Kathleen Wall.

From August 1, 2023 to July 31, 2024 the SWG distributed 51 *Ebriefs* to an average of 600 people each issue.

### Grain

This next half-century of *Grain* began with another year of stellar issues! Volumes 51.1 through 51.4 featured new work from 88 writers and poets from across Turtle Island and the UK, for a total of 79 poems and 32 prose stories; visual art from four diverse artists, including David Garneau, Joan Butterfield, Jeff Dillon, and Jenny Lewis; the six winning pieces from the 35<sup>th</sup> Annual Short *Grain* Contest, selected by judges Leona Theis and Daniel Scott Tysdal; and the six winning pieces from the 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Hybrid *Grain* Contest for Experimental Writing, selected by judges Chelene Knight and Michael Trussler.

Between September 15, 2023 and June 5, 2024, *Grain* received a total of 2,944 regular submissions (1,579 poetry; 1,115 fiction, and 250 creative nonfiction). On average, *Grain* reached its monthly Submittable cap of 300 submissions by mid-month. Individual issue sales increased slightly in 2024 with volumes 51.1, 51.2, and 51.3 selling out; as a result, additional copies of 51.4 were ordered. Subscriptions remained steady at an average of 405 per quarter.

To celebrate *Grain*'s 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary, a special edition of *Grain* was published in Fall 2023. The issue featured two guest editors. Sharon Bala (prose) and Jim Johnstone (poetry), and was designed by guest designer, Tim Neal; it featured the work of 43 writers and artwork by Canadian visual artist, Claire Designations. To promote the issue, two launches were held: at the Bassment in Saskatoon, hosted by dee Hobsbawn-Smith, with readers Danica Lorer, Dave Margoshes, Elizabeth Phillips, and Betsy Rosenwald, and at the MacKenzie Art Gallery in Regina, hosted by Kathleen Wall, with readers Judith Krause, Gerald Hill, Michael Trussler, and Zachari Logan.

Both Mari-Lou Rowley (Editor) and Brenda Schmidt (Associate Poetry Editor) completed their tenures with 51.2 and 51.3, respectively. Joining Kate O'Gorman, Associate Prose Editor, were two new faces to Grain's editorial team: Elena Bentley, as Editor, and Taidgh Lynch, as Associate Poetry Editor. Shirley Fehr (Art Editor/ Designer), Delane Just (Proofreader), Tea Gerbeza (SWG Program Coordinator), and Andrea MacLeod (SWG Executive Assistant), all continued to offer their invaluable skills to the creation, development, and circulation of each Grain issue.

The 36<sup>th</sup> Annual Short *Grain* Contest, judged by Cassidy McFadzean (poetry) and Danny Ramadan (fiction), received a total of 147 individual submissions, consisting of 123 poetry and 113 fiction pieces. Winners were announced in August 2024, with the winning selections to be published in Fall 2024 (52.1). At the time of submitting this report, the 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual Hybrid *Grain* Contest for Experimental Writing is open for submissions, and Jordan Abel and Kate Siklosi will act as judges.

Grain's contributors, once again, received recognition at the national level. Eleven contributors were selected from volumes 49.3 to 50.3 for *Best Canadian Poetry 2024* (Biblioasis), and 50.2 contributor, Dawn Muenchrath, received an Honourable Mention for Fiction at the 2024 National Magazine Awards.

Grain continued to strive to maintain its mandate to feature eclectic writing from new and established authors and poets from all communities, and to nurture Saskatchewan-based writers. The Grain team also committed to growing and establishing new relationships with writers and readers within the larger CanLit community, and to reaching new audiences, in

part through social media campaigns, establishing a monthly newsletter, and taking part in community events.

Grain is immensely grateful for the ongoing support from the Cheryl and Henry Kloppenburg Foundation, the Canada Council for the Arts, Saskatchewan Lotteries through SaskCulture, and from its individual donors.

As *Grain* moves forward into a new fiscal year, I hope to honour the vision of *Grain*'s founders who wrote the following in the inaugural issue of *Grain*, which was first seeded in June of 1973: "We hope the harvest will continue." Yes—I promise to grow *Grain*, nurture its writers, cultivate great writing, and offer that harvest to readers across this country and beyond. Let the harvest continue!

## Audit Committee Report 2023-2024

The Audit Committee meets online quarterly with the Executive Director to review financial results compared to budget. Meeting minutes are submitted to the Board.

The Executive Director closely monitor finances and budget, especially through several changes in financial support staff.

A representative of the external auditor met with the Audit Committee, Executive Director, and temporary bookkeeper to review draft audited financial statements to July 31, 2024. There were no significant audit findings.

- The audit qualification due to inability to ensure completeness of sponsorship and donation revenue is standard for most charities.
- Guaranteed investment certificates are now classified as current assets due to risk assessment focusing
  on liquidity over maturity date.
- Overall assets exceed liabilities ensuring ability to settle debts.
- There is economic dependence on government grant funding (74% of revenue).
- There was approximately \$20,000 operating loss plus \$10,000 amortization expense for capital assets purchased in previous years.
- Decrease in cash was just under \$17,000. Cash management is good.
- As government funding remains stagnant while costs increase, the Guild will increase its focus on self-generated revenue and donations.
- There has been no change to significant accounting policies.
