


## SASKATCHEWAN WRITERS' GUILD

2021 - 2022 ANNUAL REPORT





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The Saskatchewan Writers' Guild (SWG) is a not-for-profit membership driven organization that strives to sustain and enhance an environment in Saskatchewan where writers and all forms of writing flourish, to promote the well-being of all writers; and to advocate on their behalf. The SWG serves a membership spanning the entire province of Saskatchewan in Treaties 2, 4, 5, 6, 8 and 10 which encompasses the unceded territories of the nêhiyawak (Cree), Anihšināpēk (Saulteaux), Dakota, Lakota, Nakota and Dené Nations and the Homeland of the Métis Nation.

## PRESIDENT'S REPORT

What a difference a year makes! Looking back at my last president's report, which was full of references to Zoom and bubbles, this seems like another world entirely. During 2021-22, we have gathered in person so much more (with appropriate precautions), sharing work and art and experiences face to face. Remember when that all seemed unfathomable? Since last year, though, some things have not changed—namely, the commitment of the Saskatchewan Writers' Guild staff and volunteers in helping this organization thrive.

In the past year, we have maintained the excellent events and programming that the Guild members have come to expect. Our membership has grown and our finances have remained strong. There has also been new business: The SWG opened a Saskatoon office in the Sask Lotteries building, with the goal of providing more programs and support for our more northern members. We launched the Guild Prize, a brand new semiannual writing contest exclusively for SWG members. And, along with the Saskatchewan Library Association and SaskBooks, we are committed to supporting the Saskatchewan Book Awards through its organizational changes.

As a board of directors, a major part of the past year has been to begin a review of our conflict of interest policy. As a non-profit organization, the SWG relies on volunteers to provide governance and oversight through the board, which is elected each fall during the annual general meeting. Currently, board members are ineligible for many benefits of general membership, including being allowed to apply for prizes, mentorships and manuscript evaluations, perform readings or lead workshops, or be published in *Grain*. Arguably most of our members are writers. and we want to limit barriers to board participation wherever possible. The governance committee has consulted other non-profit arts organizations, as well as having surveyed our membership, to inform our ongoing work around this policy. Our hope is that a renewed conflict of interest policy will result in more interest from members wanting to serve on the board.

Thank you to this group of volunteers—David Schleich, Margot Johnson, Heather Winter, Andrew Christoffel, Andrea Martineau and Monica Johnson—for their time and dedication. A special thank you to Jack Walton for his years as president and, more recently, past-president. A wealth of knowledge, Jack



will be leaving the board (reluctantly, I'm sure!) as I step down from my two-year role as president. Thank you to all of our members for allowing us to serve you.

The SWG is as strong as it is because of an enthusiastic staff, diligent board and wonderful executive director, Tracy Hamon. As members of this longstanding treasure of an organization, we are lucky to have all of these people in our court.

## EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

The past fiscal year flew by like a bat in search of an evening meal. There was the determined dip and dart in the dark—the Saskatchewan Writers' Guild (SWG) moving in and out of person for programming and services for most of the fiscal year until we finally flew into the full belly of in-person events.

In 2021-2022, the SWG began hovering upside down in a cave-like world, stretching our wings in and out. As the door opened and closed, we were able to see some light again. Having groomed ourselves on hybrid programs for more than a year, in spring of 2022 we opened up our program gates and began sharing words and events in public. And yet, despite the continued uncertainty of the ongoing pandemic, high gas prices, global anxiety, and the general flummoxed state of all things travel-like, the SWG had a really good year.

How did we manage that you ask? Well, let me say with boundless appreciation, we are always grateful for our SWG Board Members. These special SWG members volunteered so much of their time and energy to the SWG, meeting in-person finally in the fall, then back online in the winter, but then in-person again in the spring. They gave up weekends and evenings to help grow and provide for our over 600

members. They generously hosted sessions at the conference, brought greetings to online and in-person events. This dedicated board celebrated and promoted the SWG inside and outside of our borders and we are thankful for their guidance, strength and guidance.

Along with our fearless leaders, we have been very fortunate this year with our funding and are appreciative of our Annual Global Funding from SaskLotteries (in partnership with SaskCulture), operating funds from the City of Regina and Canada Council, and the smaller grants for programming from the City of Saskatoon and Community Initiatives. Canada Council also generously provided us with reopening funding for in-person programming and we applied and received the Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy and the Canadian Emergency Rent Subsidy. Our funders help us help our members and we are grateful for their support!

The old adage is that you can do more with more is true—with a bit more funding, we were able to do more programming and services for our members! In programming, we continued our virtual model for workshops, lectures, readings, Virtual Writer-in-Residence, and talks. Intermittently,

we began meeting in person, first with the Kloppenburg Award Reception/Announcement and the SWG Fall Conference/AGM in Saskatoon, then not again until our spring programming: spring magazine launches, workshops, Apprentice Reading, and City of Regina Writing Award reception. Of course, the credit for programming falls onto the highly creative (and gifted) team of Yolanda Hansen, Cat Abenstein, Tea Gerbeza, Debbie Sunchild-Petersen, and our intern Tanisha Khan. There are so many adjectives and adverbs that I could use, but I cannot do them enough justice other than to say they are an outstanding crew and I am delighted to have them on my team.

Our publications continue to thrive.
Thanks to Mari-Lou Rowley and associates
Brenda Schmidt and Kate O'Gorman for
navigating *Grain* into the beginnings of its
celebratory year. Subscriptions are on the
rise and submissions are like bats eating
their body weight in insects each month.
The SWG featured a special pandemic
issue of *spring* magazine, and the youth
writing in *Windscript* dazzled us again—our
thanks to expert editors Edward Willett,
gillian harding-russell, Elena Bentley, and
P.J. Worrell for their skills to help produce

these remarkable publications. Once again, thank you to the talented Shirley Fehr for her illustrious design work and insight into the layout and production of the SWG's publications and for her amazing editorship of *Freelance* and *Ebriefs*.

Thank you to our administrative guru Andrea MacLeod for keeping the office on track and smoothly operational. From memberships, to mail, to overseeing the website, she provides industrious and dependable support for all of the SWG office. And last but never least, thanks again to our meticulous Financial Manager Jacqueline Fry for fearlessly wrestling all things numbered and making sure we are able to fly out of the cave.



# PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

## **Manuscript Evaluation Service**

This program assists writers at all levels of development with professional evaluations of completed manuscripts. Twenty-five writers submitted manuscripts to the program in the genres of fiction (including children's fiction), nonfiction and poetry.

#### Virtual Writer-in-Residence

Leslie Vryenhoek (Sept-Nov 2021) and Gail Bowen (Feb-Apr 2022) were the SWG's Virtual Writers-in-Residence for 2021-22. This program gives SWG members living outside Regina and Saskatoon access to a professional Writer-in-Residence through Zoom. Leslie and Gail worked with 35 SWG members.



## **Mentorship Program**



# WRITING FESTIVALS

### **Writing North 2022**

From January 27-29, the SWG and the University of Saskatchewan's MFA Program hosted Writing North 12: Tenacity.

348 people attended the events live while 807 viewed the recorded events after.

### **Penned Up!**

We know how hard it can be to make time to write, so we wanted to provide a small solution for our membership by introducing Penned Up!

Our objectives for this program are to provide a two-hour period and space for folks to drop in and write. We also want these *Penned Up!* sessions to be opportunities for members to build community, gather together in a shared space, meet writing goals, commit to writing, and to protect creative time by coming to write.

We host virtual Zoom drop-ins on a monthly schedule between September and May. Over 50 people participated in more than three events.

## **Poetry & A Pint**

The Poet Laureate's Poetry & A Pint at Bushwakker's Brew Pub was back May 21 after a two-year hiatus. Saskatchewan's Poet Laureate Carol Rose Golden Eagle read and hosted readings by fellow Regina and area poets Courtney Bates-Hardy, George Grassick, gillian harding-russell, Erik Mehlsen, and Bruce Rice.

## **Author Readings Program**

This well-established SWG program was another big success! We continued to be flexible with our readings due to the realities of living with Covid and approved online readings in addition to in-person readings.

Eighty-one different schools, libraries, and community groups hosted readings by 49 Saskatchewan authors. In this fiscal year, there have been 115 approved readings—87 readings were in-person and 28 were online with 23,329 attendees!

One online reading had over 16,000 views from children, youth, and adults from around Saskatchewan! It was put on by the Saskatchewan Literacy Network and featured SWG member Miriam Körner and Bernice Johnson-Laxdal for their book. When the Trees Crackle with Cold. Thank you to the tireless efforts of organizers who connect audiences and authors across Saskatchewan.

#### Well-Versed: A Lecture Series

The SWG hosted two virtual lectures this vear featuring well-established Canadian writers. Writers and audience members from all over Canada attended these events. which were recorded and available on the SWG's YouTube channel.

# POETS LAUREATE

## Carol Rose GoldenEagle Saskatchewan Poet Laureate

As Poet Laureate, Carol had a busy year meeting virtually with classes and writing groups, and reading or performing at in-person events. Some events included lectures or readings organized by libraries, Heritage Regina, Buffalo People Arts Institute, Last Mountain Lake Cultural Centre, Bushwakkers Brew Pub, as well as visits to schools including: Cornwall Alternative School, Lumsden Elementary School and MJ Coldwell School.

## **PUBLICATIONS**

## Grain

Now in its 50th year, *Grain, the journal of eclectic writing,* has undertaken many new initiatives in addition to publishing exciting and diverse work by regional, national and international writers. Fiftieth-anniversary planning is well underway, and the magazine continues to grow in reach and content.

Volume 49 consisted of four regular issues, publishing 102 writers for a total of 112 pieces, plus six short *Grain* winners. *Grain* had an average of 420 subscribers per issue, up slightly from last year, while single issue sales of 99 were down from 146 last year, partly due to distributor problems. General submissions also rose to 3046 from 2950 (1409 poetry, 1289 fiction, 349 non-fiction), with 388 from Saskatchewan. Volume 49 featured the work of visual artists Meryl McMaster (49.1), Eric Louie (49.2), Barbara Cole (49.3), and Anne Brochu Lambert (49.4).

Grain's editorial team includes Brenda Schmidt (poetry) and Kate O'Gorman (prose). We welcome incoming proofreader Delane Just, and thank outgoing proofreader Lean MacLean-Evans for her work over the years.

Judges for our 34th annual Short *Grain* contest were Sheri Benning (poetry) and Sean Michaels (fiction). Ninety-eight people submitted 145 fiction pieces and 110 people submitted 208 poetry pieces.

Grain's website is undergoing a redesign to support better technology and to herald our 50th year. Interviews with the visual artists of each issue are now posted on the website. Additionally, Grain has established a monthly social media strategy, including weekly features and content excerpts. Thanks to the SWG team, Tea Gerbeza, Andrea MacLeod, and Shirley Fehr for their help with these initiatives.

We are grateful to Cheryl and Henry Kloppenburg for their ongoing support of the Short *Grain* Contest and for funding the new *Hybrid Grain* Contest, which opened in August 2022.

*Grain* also thanks the Canada Council for the Arts and Saskatchewan Lotteries through SaskCulture for their continued support.

# AUDIT COMMITTEE REPORT 2021-22

The audit committee now meets online quarterly with the ED and finance manager to review quarterly financial results. Meeting minutes are maintained and submitted to the board.

Both the ED and finance manager are attentive to internal controls around financial reporting and closely monitor finances and budget. SWG is fortunate to have knowledgeable and dedicated staff. The audit partner met with the committee, ED, and finance manager to review draft audited financial statements to July 31, 2022. There were no significant audit findings.

The auditor was pleased to note that project accounting plus a deferred revenue tracking spreadsheet have been implemented. She was highly complimentary of purchase controls. She was also complimentary about presentation of financial statements to the board at regular meetings.

#### The auditor also noted:

- She has worked on the SWG file for many years and is now a partner with the firm.
- Membership revenue can now be verified and this qualification has been removed from the audit report.
- Future donation revenue will be segregated in the GL so donations through the website, which should be verifiable, will be separately reported.
- RBC investment savings has been reclassed from investments to cash.
- All GICs are classed as short-term assets.
- The cash balance is healthy.
- The Grain website has been amortized 50% current year and 50% next year in anticipation that it will be replaced next year.
- There is a note regarding the allocation of wages/benefits to multiple expense lines.
- Net income is positive and on budget.
- Cash flow is positive.
- The only audit adjustments were related to fixed assets and amortization. No change to net income.
